Choosing a tinter

Like everything in life, you get what you pay for. Sometimes it makes sense to seek the cheapest option possible - an auto window film installation is not one of those times. You want to entrust your vehicle to a professional installer who:

- ☐ Knows what they're doing
- ☐ Recommends the best film for your needs
- ☐ Abides by all State or Territory regulations
- ☐ Provides a warranty on the film and the installation

Choosing an installer that is a WFAANZ member will ensure you tick all these boxes. Our members adhere to a strict code of practice that sets the benchmark for quality for the Australian window film industry. Things to consider

In Australia the darkness of the aftermarket window film you are legally allowed to use on your windows is regulated by State or Territory road and traffic authorities. Deviating from these rules could render your car unroadworthy, and may result in a fine. Visit the WFAANZ website for a breakdown of your State or Territory regulations.

VLT stands for visible light transmittance. It measures the light that passes through glass, so the lower the VLT percentage, the darker the film. Always ask your tinter about your State or Territory's VLT limit before proceeding with the job.

Also, if you have a car with a telescopic rod aerial built into the glass you should request a non-metallised film so as not to affect the AM/FM radio reception strength.
